#### Pastor Mark's Post

#### Tradition, Today, Tomorrow

January newsletter articles are written in mid to late December. That means that as I write this little message I am basking in the familiar and comfortable traditions of Christmas. This year, our Christmas tree is decked with, Susan's favorite, white lights. She has been accommodating me with my multicolored tradition for the past couple of years, so this time it's her turn.

**Tradition brings us joy**. Since marrying each other, Susan and I have each gotten rid of half our ornaments. That means that we've kept the ones our children and grandchildren have made for us. Each one brings us a sweet measure of joy and happy memories. We like it so much, it's really all that we put on the tree, besides the lights.

**Tradition empowers us**. It keeps us moving to recreate the satisfaction of doing it again. Like learning how to do a task, we practice what we know. I'm sometimes amazed that we move a tree into the house for a month (or two). Why? It's a lot of work! But we love it.

**Tradition reminds us of important truths**. They are part of our "institutional memory." In churches and organizations there are repetitions of ritual, mission statements, and creeds that help us stay grounded. As we launch into 2025, the tradition of a New Year celebration is to lay aside the old year and embrace the new. We do it with a song at midnight which tells us to keep our memories alive while we celebrate the new. How does a church congregation begin a new year? Tradition? Today? Tomorrow?

**Tradition can become hobbles**. When I was a groom at the harness racing track, I used to wash down racehorses after they ran. The hobbles kept some horses running in a certain way, and never in a gallop. Harness racing is never done at a gallop. Church leaders are often met with the Seven Last Words of the Church: "We've never done it that way before." Some churches won't reinvent themselves to stay relevant in the present-day context of ministry. They can only run a certain way.

Tradition resists change. It's not just organizations that must be able to adjust for today and tomorrow. Individuals are a part of it too. In this new year:

□ Culture will change − events, opinions, fads, fashions.

□ Circumstances will force us to do things we've never done before.

□ A shifting economy will change how we work and do business.

□ Physical changes in our bodies will affect our desires, abilities, and our lifestyle − sometimes dramatically.

□ Relationships will be severed or renewed as friends or relatives react to circumstances or move miles away. Some tradition-bound people will experience a miserable new year if they interpret every change as a loss.

Tradition focuses on the past. When we must have everything the way it has always been, we are often disappointed with what we have now. We don't appreciate our young because their world is so different from our youth. We don't like our community because it's getting less familiar to us. We can't even keep up with Jesus because he is wanting to reach people today, not yesterday.

Tradition is not the essence of Christianity, it's relationship. It's Christian "life" and that means it not about preserving a building, or a memorial of the past but a center of activity that is reaching people we live with in our community. The Bible teaches us that faith does remember, and we do well to remember what God has done for us. But it further teaches us that faith "works" for the sake of others, or it is dead.

Tradition can keep us from listening to God. Have you ever stopped listening to someone because you already know what they are going to say? We don't expect God to say anything new, so we don't listen to his Word or work to put it into a context for reach others today or tomorrow. The religious, tradition-bound Pharisees of Jesus' day resisted him more strongly than anyone else. Jesus did not hold back when he told them they had a fine way of throwing out God's purposes before their traditions and rules.

Tradition is not bad at all and good ones can be built. A church that is walking with Jesus will do what he has always done. We will focus on and reach people today and tomorrow what better tradition could we possibly build?

# Mission Moment

## A New Command

As Jesus gathered with his disciples for his last supper, he not only communed with them, but he also served them in a unique way. Before the meal began, he took off his outer robe, knelt down with a basin of water and a towel, and washed their feet. It was a stunning act of service by the King of kings and Lord of lords! Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: "I give you a new command: Love one another. Just as I have loved you, you are also to love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35)

This familiar text is a reminder of what sets Jesus' followers apart: a self-sacrificing love for one another. Jesus did not say "it would be really neat if you would be nice to one another." He was not asking his followers to tolerate or put up with one another. He did not offer his example of humble service as a suggestion among a buffet of options. He clearly states this as a new command that is a mark of every single disciple of Jesus. Jesus makes the clear connection that this love will be noticed by the world and is key to sharing Jesus' love and bearing witness to the Gospel to the world. So, this loving one another thing is *really* important for our mission in the world!

But what does it mean to love one another? What does this look like in your local church and current ministry context? How do we relate to and connect with one another in ways that are loving, forgiving, serving, encouraging, and, in all ways, build up the body of Christ? As an association of Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ, I believe that it is essential to connect and relate to one another in ways that strengthen our mutual mission and ministry and lead to healthier churches in each of our communities.

For this reason, I would like you to join me and others from across our association as we take two days to dive deeper into this topic. Our Winter Retreats will gather in beautiful Concan, Texas next month around the theme of "One Another". There are two identical retreats being offered, so choose the one that best fits in your schedule: Sunday evening, February 2 through Tuesday noon, February 4 or Wednesday evening, February 5 through Friday noon, February 7. Each retreat will feature two teaching tracks. LCMC's Coordinator for Leadership and Pastoral Development Christian Huntley will be teaching the Leadership Track while Texas District Council member Barbara Hoover will be leading the Devotional Track.

The retreat is open to all and is an affordable opportunity to grow in your walk with God and develop your relational capacity to love others as Jesus loves us. If you register by January 11, the retreat registration costs \$120 and includes the program, food, and lodging.
